## How to Become an **ESC Member Institution**

### **Eligibility**

All institutions of higher education are invited to become ESC members if they have demonstrated a commitment to engaged scholarship, as evidenced by the Carnegie Foundation's Elective Classification in Community Engagement or by other evidence, as evaluated by the ESC Membership Committee.

#### Annual institutional membership fees (in US dollars)

- R1: Doctoral Universities Very High Research Activity (\$5,000)
- R2: Doctoral Universities High Research Activity (\$3,500)
- D/PU: Doctoral/Professional Universities (\$3.500)
- Master's Colleges and Universities (\$2,500)
- Baccalaureate Colleges (\$1,500)
- Associate's Colleges (\$1,000)
