Voices

I ka wā ma mua, ka wā ma hope the time in front, is the time that is behind

- Carve spaces for stories to surface (individual & collective)
- Listen & create room for each voice to be heard
- Honor stories of struggles/processes that emerge
- Build upon collective wisdom
- Identify core building blocks of strategic planning, goal setting, milestone markers

Connection

"...this relationship between the people and the land was and is expressed as 'aloha "āina' (love for the land). The land is deity and the land is beloved family; people feed the land and the land feeds the people; the landscape itself, even rocks (or especially rocks) are part of the living world and are beloved." - Noenoe Silva

- Strengthen relationship through stories, sharing different types of work, and planning processes
- Integrate knowledge gained through traditional practice and academic praxis
- Allow time for connections to be strengthened via questions, conflict, building clarity from confusion, communication differences, and reaffirmed commitment to common purpose

Application

- Base program specifics around content knowledge of organizations and resources that are available in the community
- Intentionally ground actions in community history, voice, choice, and power
- Continue rhythm of creating space for stories to be heard and relationships to be built
- Connect core building blocks to long term strategic goals
- Debrief, Evaluate, & Communicate

 - Increase partnerships and sharing of expertise with community organizations.

HSHK Community Engagement Framework (February 2012).

- Education, research and practice are linked to community needs, visions and aspirations.
- Engagement structure: types and scale of activities.
- Historical (and current) challenges of research exploitation -- CE covenant.
 - 1. Community perspective matters.
 - 2. Relationships are enduring, mutually beneficial and two way engagements.
 - 3. Resources align with community based visions.
 - 4. Students apply course work to real world experiences.
