Using participatory discourse analysis to evaluate unequal community recovery trajectories (Symposium (20 min))

During disasters engagement with the public and stakeholders is critical to creating recovery plans/interventions centered on resident needs and concerns. When engagement and participation are not fostered a variety of secondary social and economic traumas may appear. I examine the consequences of this process in Japan using community-based participatory research.



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"I'm simply showing up for a visit and offering support": Conducting Community-Engaged Research with Birth-Workers in Southern Alabama (PechaKucha)

I will highlight lessons learned, as well as facilitators and barriers to providing care in a medically underserved region.

Relentless Stigma: What We've Learned from Years of Community-Engaged Substance Use Research (PechaKucha)

Stigma is known to serve as a notable barrier for individuals with substance use disorder (SUD) in accessing treatment, and yet the experiences of individuals with SUD who experience this stigma are not well documented. Not Just Another Mental Health Non-profit: The Mindfull Experience (PechaKucha)
