OVERVIEW

In 2014, Oregon State University was one of 12 universities that took part in a national Imagining America initiative that invited citizens to imagine and consider new ways for Cooperative Extension to serve as a vital resource for communities in the 21st century.

In 2015, OSU took this model and expanded it, continuing the mission of "ExtRe" by seeking new partnerships, both on and off campus.

DESIGN

ExtRe is a directed and intentional dialogue about the role Extension can play in Oregon. Each year it convenes a group of Extension staff, OSU faculty, and community members around a specific theme and set of questions.

2014 - the Arts, Humanities & Design

2015 - Humanitarian Engineering

This year in ExtRe15 we shifted from art to engineering, seeking specifically to explore connections and solutions within the growing field of Humanitarian Engineering (HE). We define HE as the co-development of science- or engineering-based solutions to improve the human condition, namely through improved access to basic human needs (e.g., clean water, clean energy), an improved quality of life, or improved level of community resilience (e.g., disaster mitigation, economic resilience).
